## GENERAL MEETING: GREG OROZCO "DEMONSTRATION ON HOW TO MAKE CORSAGES"

Greg Orozco will be showing us how to make corsages using various orchids. This should be a very interesting presentation, showing us other ways to display our orchids. The holidays are coming up and what would be a better way to help someone celebrate.

A single bloom with foliage and filler is a popular boutonniere. This is easily done by using a wired bloom, a Dendrobium for example, and adding a few stems of baby's breath and an ivy leaf. The baby's breath and leaf are not wired but secured around the Dendrobium with an extra layer of floral tape. The end of the wire, covered with floral tape, can be curled around a pen or pencil. The boutonniere will be secured with a long pin from the back side of the lapel. Multiple flower boutonnieres can be made the same way, 2 or 3 flowers will need to be wired, lighter elements may be secured with the floral tape. Ends on a multiple flower boutonniere can be gathered with floral tape and left straight or curled. They can also be gathered near the top with floral tape but individual stems left in an unwrapped cluster.

Single flower corsages use much the same technique as boutonnieres but are usually slightly larger, either due to the selection of a larger flower or to the addition of more filler, foliage and accessories. Multiple flower corsages are assembled from pieces similar to single flower boutonnieres. Start by wiring a flower bud along with some filler flowers, greens or ribbon, leaving a long piece of taped wire which other elements will be taped to, this will be the spine of the corsage. Prepare a number of elements as outlined in the boutonniere's section. Wire and tape them to the spine, and curl the end of the spine. A larger corsage may require 2 pins to secure it to the garment. Wrist corsages are made the same way as shoulder corsages but have to be mounted on a special wristlet with metal clamps. These can be purchased at most florists. The clamps are secured around the spine of the corsage and the elastic band is slipped around the wrist. A small corsage can also be secured to a barrette clip with wire for securing to the hair.

## Winter Rest

Orchid tips for winter...

- If you are a windowsill grower, the light will be entirely different at this time of year. Assess it carefully and make any necessary adjustments. A south window may be brighter due to bare trees and the sun being lower in the sky. Watch for sunburn and move plants back from the window or add a sheer curtain to cut down the light.
- Shorter days and gloomy weather in many parts of the country can cause plants to produce soft growths that are more susceptible to pests and disease. Some orchids will not flower if they do not receive enough light. If necessary, use a growlight on a timer to provide additional light in winter.

- Orchids grow more slowly in winter and will need less water and fertilizer. Most growers cut their fertilizer back to twice a month at half strength. Monitor orchids to keep them at their proper moisture level for their type. Generally, orchids will need about half as much water in winter as they do in summer. Some orchids must have a dry winter rest in order to flower. Click here to learn how to water your orchids.
- The loss of humidity as a result of forced air heating can take its toll on your orchids. Remember, most orchids grow optimally with 60-75% humidity. If your home is especially dry, and you will know by the way your own skin reacts to winter, provide extra humidity for your orchids. A tried and true me set orchid pots on trays of pebbles that are filled with water; just make thod is to sure your plant is not setting in the water. Misting a couple times a day can also help.
- Winter is cold, so protect plants from drafts. If buds start falling off of a Phalaenopsis infloresence the first thing to suspect is a drafty window (second thing is ethylene gas from a nearby heater). Do not put plants close enough to a window to touch the glass!

If you happen to be lucky enough to live in an area where you grow your orchids outdoors year-round, don't be caught with your guard down. Even South Florida, the Gulf Coast and Southern California can experience damaging cold temperatures. Have a plan and supplies for covering or moving plants should cold weather be heading your way. Florida has has an unusually wet winter. Keep an eye out for fungal infections on leaves, and especially Botrytis on flowers. Provide ample air movement and keep growing area free of plant debris.

Providing a little extra attention to your orchids at this time of year will get them through the winter in good health and bloom!!!
